THE PRESENTATION OF CHRIST IN THE TEMPLE 28 JANUARY 2024 (CANDLEMASS, TRANSP.)

Welcome to St. Augustine's, Grahame Park especially if you are visiting us for the first time. The Order of Mass is in the Mass booklet. We aspire to be CONFIDENT - CREATIVE COMPASSIONATE ambassadors of Christ!

- ♦ Candlemass. The Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple and the **Purification of Saint Mary the Virgin.** The celebration of Christmas may be understood to extend at its fullest length until today's feast. It is called Candlemas from the custom of blessing candles inspired by the Gospel. Luke 2:22-40 includes the Song of Simeon that praises Christ as 'a light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of your people Israel. The liturgical year started with the successive lighting of the candles of the Advent wreath, now this light finds its fulfilment in the blessing and procession with lighted candles. We celebrate the arrival of the Lord in his temple, the Church.
- 4th February 10 am mass: **First Sunday of the Month** with anointing the sick and receiving the blessing of Saint Blaise that God may deliver us from every disease of the throat and from every other illness. This is also the week of our 'First Friday' for Confessions. We can prepare ourselves for the mass by examining our conscience in a deeper way.
- **Easter:** Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, 14th February. Easter is on Sunday 31st March.
- **&** 'Lent Book'. This year we will have the opportunity to read a Lent book with our brothers and sisters at St Matthias. "Lent with the Beloved Disciple", by Bishop Michael Marshall, invites us on a six-week journey in the company of the 'beloved disciple' as found in the Gospel of St John. COLLECT

A lmighty ever-living God, we humbly implore your majesty that, just as your Only Begotten Son was presented on this day in the Temple in the substance of our flesh, so, by your grace, we may be presented to you with minds made pure. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

The Lord God says this: Look, I am going to send my messenger to prepare a way before me. And the Lord you are seeking will suddenly enter his Temple; and the angel of the covenant whom you are longing for, yes, he is coming, says the Lord of Hosts. Who will be able to resist the day of his coming? Who will remain standing when he appears? For he is like the refiner's fire and the fullers' alkali. He will take his seat as refiner and purifier; he will purify the sons of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, and then they will make the offering to the Lord as it should be made. The offering of Judah and Jerusalem will then be welcomed by the Lord as in former days, as in the years of old. // The Word of the Lord.

SECOND READING From Saint Paul's First Letter to the Hebrews (2:14-18) Since all the children share the same blood and flesh, Christ too shared equally in it, so that by his death he could take away all the power of the devil, who had power over death, and set free all those who had been held in slavery all their lives by the fear of death. For it was not the angels that he took to himself; he took to himself descent from Abraham. It was essential that he should in this way become completely like his brothers so that he could be a compassionate and trustworthy high priest of God's religion, able to atone for human sins. That is, because he has himself been through temptation he is able to help others who are tempted. // The Word of the Lord.

PARISH CATECHISM **The virtues.** A virtue is an habitual and firm disposition to do good. It allows the person not only to perform good acts, but to give the best of himself/herself. The goal of virtuous life is to become like God. **The human virtues.** The moral virtues are acquired by human effort. They are the fruit and seed of morally good acts. **The cardinal virtues:** Four virtues play a pivotal role and accordingly are called 'cardinal'; all the others are grouped around them. They are: prudence, justice, fortitude and temperance. *Prudence* is the virtue that disposes practical reason to discern our true good in every circumstance and to choose the right means of achieving it. Prudence is 'right reason in action.' It is called the charioteer of the other virtues. It is prudence that immediately guides the judgement of conscience. *Justice* is the moral virtue that wills to give their due to God and neighbor. *Fortitude* ensures firmness in difficulties and constancy in the pursuit of good. *Temerance* moderates the attraction of pleasures and provides balance in the use of created goods. **The virtues and grace.** It is not easy for us, wounded by sin, to maintain moral balance. Everyone should always ask for strength, frequent the sacraments, c-operate with the Holy Spirit. (next time: The Theological Virtues.)
